Purpose

The ways in which science, technology and intelligence – both human and artificial - can transform and provide solutions for the post COVID world. UK demonstrating global leadership, with the backdrop of beautiful Scotland.

We need to think and create our way out of the current crisis; this is a challenge and an opportunity for science and technology. We learn lessons for the future and we show case innovation and values. The summit should be the first post vaccine lifting of spirits and horizons. It will be what Lord Rees describes as a "cathedral for the mind". The three-day summit, planned for the week of September 6 ,is a chance to address the big themes, intellectually and pragmatically. Speakers will reference the character of this Enlightenment and the great tradition of reason and innovation both in England and Scotland.

The event, attended by key thinkers, practitioners and policy makers, will allow creative face to face talks amidst the beauty of nature with wider online participation. Invited guests only and a limited number, we estimate 100 max. We will have some Government speakers but it is not a political event. We will also reference the work and thinking of COP26. We will find the best practice in new businesses and concentrate particularly on carbon targets and land use.

The summit is in the magnificent setting of Braemar where the Fife Arms in Cairngorms National Park will host the summit and the final day celebrations of Scottish entertainment, and music by Nicola Benedetti.
